WHY HARMONISING SEAH REPORTING?

Very limited global knowledge on SEAH incidents, their extent and their typology

Lack of evidence to guide risk mitigation, prevention and response to SEAH

Everyone is investing resources into creating processes and systems to respond to a global problem



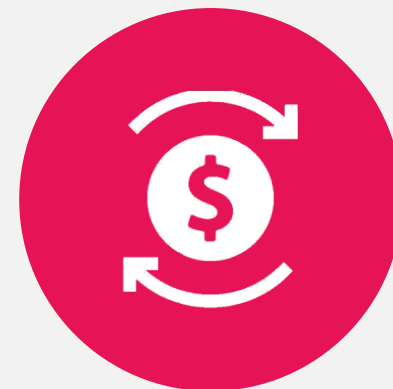
Enhance transparency & accountability which will help reducing under-reporting & re-establishing trust in the international aid system



Allow trends analysis for collective learning & evidence to inform actions, policies and strategies on PSEAH



Create a community of practice to foster peer-to-peer learning and exchange between organisations on improving our work on PSEAH



Optimize resources (time and money) by allowing organisations to rely on a joint system reducing the reporting burden and providing evidence on how to best allocate resources.

PROJECT RATIONALE AND TIMELINE

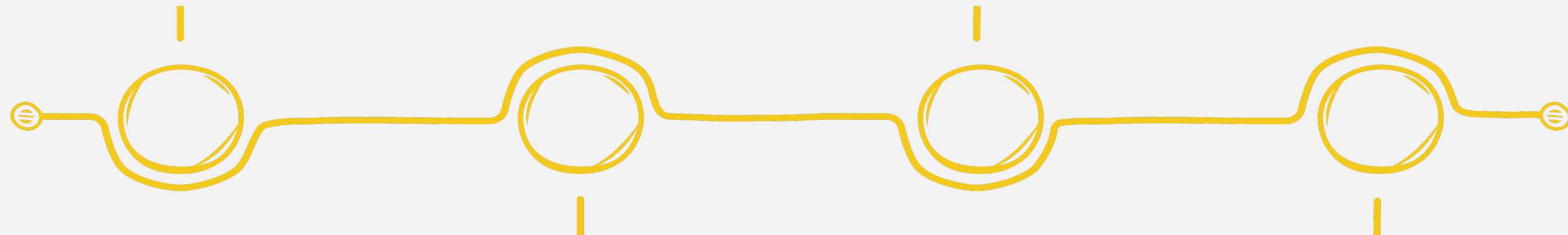
2022-2023

Past situation

No-one really captured SEAH data & organisations rarely shared or reported it, unless forced to do so (for instance, in the case of a scandal).

Phase 2: piloting a harmonised framework

Based on consultations, a framework was designed which will be tested by a diverse cohort of organisations and reviewed by key stakeholders like donors to identify the best way forward for harmonisation.



Phase 1: understanding the current situation

Consultations were conducted with 60 organisations which highlighted that they captured similar but incomparable data on SEAH & that reporting & analysis varied from organisation to organisation.

2021-2022

Phase 3: scaling up a centralised system

The harmonised scheme is scaled up & all signatory organisations report the same set of comparable data to a centralised database system with real-time analysis available to peers, donors & the public.

ZOOMING IN : PILOTING THE SCHEME



TIMING

October 2022 - September 2023 (organisations can join at any time during the pilot)



OBJECTIVES

1. Assess feasibility to join with stakeholders (implementers, funders, coordinating bodies)
2. Test, adjust, improve & validate the framework



AVAILABLE SUPPORT

Group learning events with pilot partners are organised quarterly & 1-1 support can be provided on request.



WHO CAN JOIN?

Any NGO (international/ local) or private sector organisation can join the pilot.

Donor endorsement is also possible.



REQUIRED COMMITMENT

1. Reporting SEAH data quarterly using the provided template
2. Provide feedback to the tool and reporting process



HOW TO JOIN?

Send us an official request (from the head of your organisation) requesting to join the SEAH Harmonised Reporting Scheme.

Key considerations and rights of pilot members:

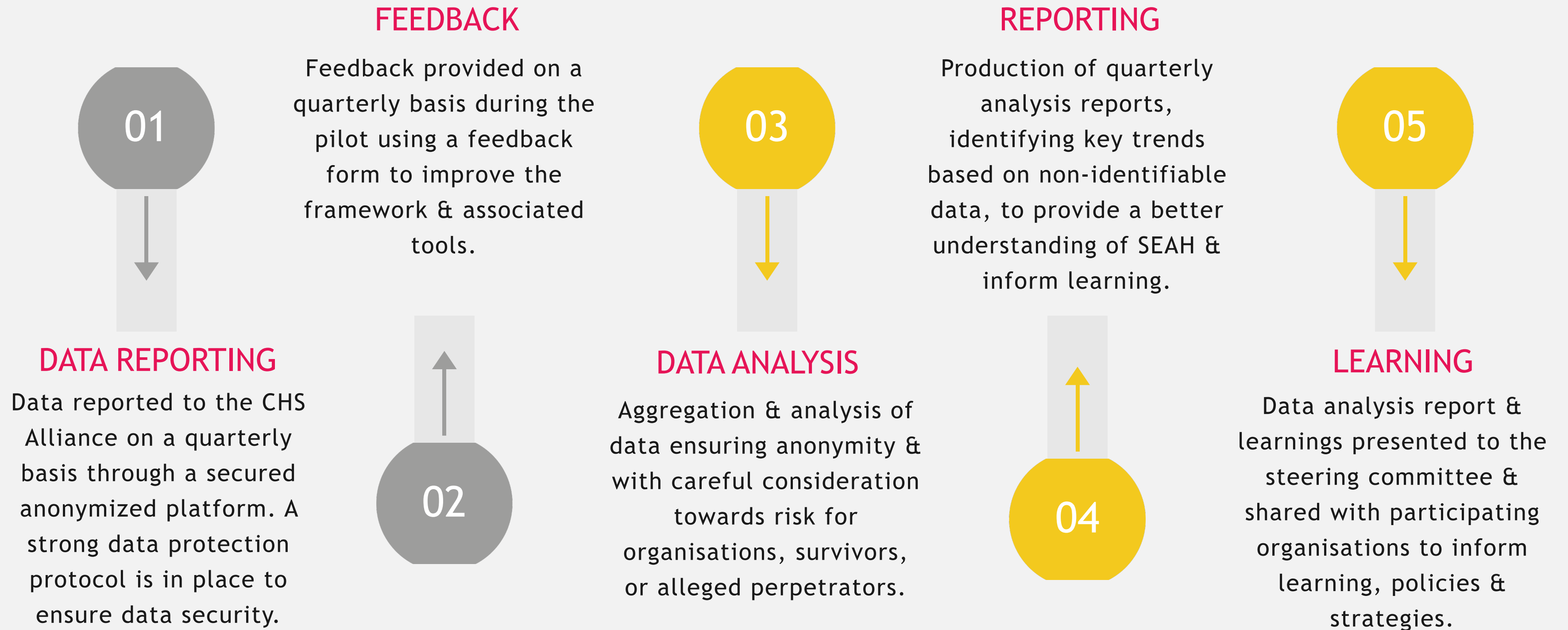
- No identifiable data is ever shared as part of the Scheme
- Organisations are free not to report on certain data fields
- Data reported is systematically and automatically aggregated: it will never be linkable to a specific organisation.
- Organisations are never identified in the trends analysis, and during the pilot trends won't be made public
- Organisations have the right to pull out from the pilot at any time and pilot participation doesn't mean automatic endorsement of the Scheme at scale-up.
- Data reporting within the Scheme is solely for trends analysis purposes, not accountability purposes.

- All data fields have drop downs with pre-defined, easy to chose from, standard answers
- Possibility to enter new answer when no pre-defined choice fits
- Multiple answers are possible for some data fields
- The following options are always available for all data fields:
 - *Do not wish to disclose this information*
 - *Risk of identification*
 - *Do not routinely collect this information*
 - *Unknown for another reason*
- All organisations will have the opportunity to provide feedback on these data fields and the pre-defined answers on a quarterly basis during the pilot
