THE CURRENT AID SYSTEM

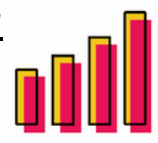
Power imbalances between people affected by crises and aid workers can lead to sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment (SEAH). CHS Alliance works to protect people from harm and drive a more accountable aid system.



CORE HUMANITARIAN STANDARD (CHS)

Protection from SEAH is woven into the nine commitments of the CHS. CHS Alliance produces key tools and guidance to support organisations, such as the CHS PSEAH Index and the guide to taking a Victim/Survivor-Centred Approach to SEAH.

HARMONISATION REPORTING SCHEME



Harmonises the way SEAH incidents are collected, analysed, and reported to better understand this issue.

Helps organisations have the right policies, processes and practice to prevent SEAH.

Helps organisations learn and adapt preventive and responsive measures.

MISCONDUCT DISCLOSURE SCHEME



Prevents known abusers from moving undetected from one organisation to another.

Helps organisations respond effectively when things go wrong.

Helps organisations recruit safely, breaking the cycle of harm.

INVESTIGATOR QUALIFICATION TRAINING SCHEME



Strengthens global capacity for survivor centred SEAH investigations, for effective local response.
